

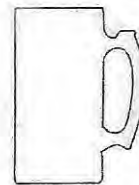
WORTSCHATZ: WORAUS TRINKEN DIE DEUTSCHEN? VOCABULARY: WHAT BEVERAGES DO GERMANS DRINK FROM?

beverage: das Getränk, die Getränke
drinking container: das Gefäß, die Gefäße
der Behälter, die Behälter
drinking wares: die Trinkwaren

4. tankard (holds a liter of beer): die Maß, die Maße
beer mug: der Maßkrug, die Maßkrüge
5. mug: der Krug, die Krüge
beer mug: der Bierkrug, die Bierkrüge / der Maßkrug, die Maßkrüge
glass mug: der Glaskrug, die Glaskrüge
stoneware mug: der Steinkrug, die Steinkrüge
mug (holds a pint or half liter of beer): das Seidel, die Seidel
- beer glas, mug: das Bierseidel, die Bierseidel
 - ½ liter mug in Franconia: Seidel or Seidla
 - term Seide is also used by the Pennsylvania Dutch in Pa Dutch Country
- the traditional, but non-embellished, stoneware mug: Keferloher
- it is named after the village of Keferloh near Munich, where they were originally produced
- liter mug: ein Liter (1/l)
½ liter mug: ein Halbes
¼ liter mug: ein Viertel
- mug, tankard (dialect): der Humpen, die Humpen
tall drinking glass, sometimes with covers enamelled with the double eagle of the Holy Roman Empire: der Adlerhumpen

MASSKRUG

These weighty Bavarian mugs are the biggest beer glasses for everyday use, presenting a challenge to the servers at Munich's Oktoberfest, who often carry eight or more at a time. The large size—each mass holds a liter—allows room for a large head on the beer. It also means fewer visits required of the servers. And the thick walls of the glass can withstand the enthusiastic and repeated toasts that are part of any evening in the beer hall.
